THE SPIRIT OF CHRISTMAS WREATHS ACROSS AMERICA

Time: 12:00 noon on Friday Dec. 11, 2015. The wreaths were to have arrived by Thursday, yet it was noon on Fri. and no news other than the wreaths were on their way from Maine.

So, beginning to panic, phone calls went out to the supposed delivery trucking company based in Columbus. Meanwhile phone calls went out to other locations in northeast Ohio who were participating in Wreaths Across America. It was learned that we needed to contact someone in Canton who was supposed to have some information. Call made. All they knew was that they did not have any wreaths scheduled to be delivered to Canfield, OH, However, we were given the name of a warehouse in Cleveland where someone we had talked to in Painesville. OH knew their wreaths were being delivered and they were to go pick them up. Call made. The wreaths were to arrive to the west side of Cleveland 3-4 pm Fri. started brainstorming, about what we could do. So we tried to call Hugh, you know the big guy, with the big voice, with the big red van. No one home! We are still trying to figure out what to do. Meanwhile we got a call from the warehouse in Cleveland, saving they were receiving our wreaths and they would be delivered to us sometime Fri. evening. Big sigh of relief! Hugh called But wait, we than learned that back. the wreaths would come to us sometime Sat. afternoon. Ceremonies were set in Poland at 10:00 an Sat. and at Ellsworth at 11:00am Sat. morning.

Hugh and Mike to the rescue!!!!! They jumped in the big red Hughmobile and headed to Cleveland. The warehouse manager agreed to stay until they arrived to pick up the wreaths! Bless you guys!

Sat. morning MGV's arrived at the Poland graveyard at 9:30 am, the Hughmobile loaded with wreaths was



already there. A moving ceremony took place. Boy Scouts participated. Army recruiter in uniform came from Warren with two young children in tow. He

wanted his children to witness the ways that we thank our veterans. The wreaths were laid, the ceremony



concluded with the playing of taps.

We proceeded to Ellsworth. From the road it appears to be but a small cemetery. As we turned in all you could see was cars lined up along the small roads within the grounds. We estimated well over 100 people were present. They had a tent set up, chairs ready for several elderly people. Colors were presented, Hugh gave a very nice speech. Wreaths representing all branches of our military were laid.

Several family members came forward to receive wreaths to lay on the graves of their



loved ones. Master Gardener Volunteers proceeded to take wreaths to other graves of veterans. As we returned back to the gathering area Hugh introduced a very special man. This frail, yet proud man was an Army

veteran who had been held captive as a



POW in Germany in World War II. As I shook his hand and thanked him for his service, with a tear in his eye he thanked me for remembering him. I told him my dad, who passed away just a year ago in Dec.., was also an Army

vet and had served in Germany. This gentle soul look at me and said "God bless him". With tears in my eyes I gave him a hug. Behind me was a line of people waiting to also thank this veteran.

I walked away, what pride I felt, being am American is so very special. I will never forget this day for the rest of my life.

God Bless America, land that we love.






